About us



■ THE OLD TESTAMENT LESSON

A reading from Exodus.

Exodus 12:1-14 | Reader: Douglas Long

♦ he Lord said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbor in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it. Your lamb shall be without blemish, a year-old male; you may take it from the sheep or from the goats. You shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month; then the whole assembled congregation of Israel shall slaughter it at twilight. They shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat it. They shall eat the lamb that same night; they shall eat it roasted over the fire with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. Do not eat any of it raw or boiled in water, but roasted over the fire, with its head, legs, and inner organs. You shall let none of it remain until the morning; anything that remains until the morning you shall burn. This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand; and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is the passover of the Lord. For I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, both human beings and animals; on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the Lord. The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt.


This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the Lord; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.

ow before the festival of the Passover, Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart from this world and go to the Father. Having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end. The devil had already put it into the heart of Judas son of Simon Iscariot to betray him. And during supper Jesus, knowing that the Father had given all things into his hands, and that he had come from God and was going to God, got up from the table, took off his outer robe, and tied a towel around himself. Then he poured water into a basin and began to wash the disciples' feet and to wipe them with the towel that was tied around him. He came to Simon Peter, who said to him, "Lord, are you going to wash my feet?" Jesus answered, "You do not know now what I am doing, but later you will understand." Peter said to him, "You will never wash my feet." Jesus answered, "Unless I wash you, you have no share with me." Simon Peter said to him, "Lord, not my feet only but also my hands and my head!" Jesus said to him, "One who has bathed does not need to wash, except for the feet, but is entirely clean. And you are clean, though not all of you." For he knew who was to betray him; for this reason he said, "Not all of you are clean."

After he had washed their feet, had put on his robe, and had returned to the table, he said to them, "Do you know what I have done to you? You call me Teacher and Lord--and you are right, for

that is what I am. So if I, your Lord and Teacher, have washed your feet, you also ought to wash one another's feet. For I have set you an example, that you also should do as I have done to you. Very truly, I tell you, servants are not greater than their master, nor are messengers greater than the one who sent them. If you know these things, you are blessed if you do them.

"Now the Son of Man has been glorified, and God has been glorified in him. If God has been glorified in him, God will also glorify him in himself and will glorify him at once. Little children, I am with you only a little longer. You will look for me; and as I said to the Jews so now I say to you, 'Where I am going, you cannot come.' I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."


THE BIDDING


Celebrant:


All are invited to participate in the Maundy foot washing.

The Celebrant continues

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me."

After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

The Sacrament to be reserved for Good Friday is moved to the Altar of Repose while the people sing the hymn.



STRIPPING AND WASHING of THE ALTAR

After the Sacrament is moved to the Altar of Repose, following the singing of the hymn, the church is stripped of all ornamentation and light as a sign of the darkness and desolation of Gethsemane and Golgotha.

During the stripping, it is customary for the congregation to read Psalm 22, the psalm associated with Christ's cry of despair from the cross, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"

Yet you are he who took me | out of the womb,* and kept me safe upon my | mother's breast. I have been entrusted to you ever | since I was born;* you were my God when I was still in my | mother's womb. Be not far from me, for | trouble is near,* and there is | none to help. Many young | bulls encircle me;* strong bulls of Balshan surround me. They open | wide their jaws at me,* like a ravening and a | roaring lion. I am poured out like water; all my | bones are out of joint;* my heart within my breast is | melting wax. My mouth is dried out like a pot-sherd; my tongue sticks to the | roof of my mouth;* and you have laid me in the dust | of the grave. Packs of dogs close me in, and gangs of evildoers cir/cle around me;* they pierce my hands and my feet; I can count | all my bones. They stare and | gloat over me;* they divide my garments among them; they cast lots | for my clothing. Be not | far away, O LORD;* you are my strength; has ten to help me. Save me | from the sword,* my life from the power | of the dog. Save me from the | lion's mouth,* my wretched body from the horns | of wild bulls. I will declare your Name | to my brethren;* in the midst of the congregation | I will praise you. Praise the Lord, | you that fear him;* stand in awe of him, O offspring of Israel; all you of Jacob's | line, give glory.

For he does not despise nor abhor the poor in their poverty;

neither does he | hide his face from them;* but when they cry to | him he hears them.

My praise is of him in the | great assembly;*

I will perform my vows in the presence of those who | worship him.

The poor shall eat and be satisfied,

and those who seek the | LORD shall praise him:*

"May your heart | live forever!"

All the ends of the earth shall remember and | turn to the LORD,* and all the families of the nations shall | bow before him.

The Agony in the Garden

Matthew 26:30-46

It is the tradition of the Church on this holy night to keep a prayerful vigil with our Lord. The Vigil begins immediately after the reading of The Agony in the Garden, and continues throughout the night. The Vigil ends on Friday morning at 8:00 a.m. with Morning Prayer.

Then they had sung the hymn, they went out to the Mount of Olives. Then Jesus said to them, 'You will all become deserters because of me this night; for it is written, "I will strike the shepherd, and the sheep of the flock will be scattered." But after I am raised up, I will go ahead of you to Galilee.' Peter said to him, 'Though all become deserters because of you, I will never desert you.' Jesus said to him, 'Truly I tell you, this very night, before the cock crows, you will deny me three times.' Peter said to him, 'Even though I must die with you, I will not deny you.' And so said all the disciples. Then Jesus went with them to a place called Gethsemane; and he said to his disciples, 'Sit here while I go over there and pray.' He took with him Peter and the two sons of Zebedee, and began to be grieved and agitated. Then he said to them, I am deeply grieved, even to death; remain here, and stay awake with me.' And going a little farther, he threw himself on the ground and prayed, 'My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me; yet not what I want but what you want.' Then he came to the disciples and found them sleeping; and he said to Peter, 'So, could you not stay awake with me one hour? Stay awake and pray that you may not come into the time of trial; the spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak.' Again he went away for the second time and prayed, 'My Father, if this cannot pass unless I drink it, your will be done.' Again he came and found them sleeping, for their eyes were heavy. So leaving them again, he went away and prayed for the third time, saying the same words. Then he came to the disciples and said to them, 'Are you still sleeping and taking your rest? See, the hour is at hand, and the Son of Man is betrayed into the hands of sinners. Get up, let us be going. See, my betrayer is at hand.'

† Please depart in silence.

If you would like to participate in The Vigil, you may return at anytime during the night for silent devotion. Those who so desire may offer their reverence at the Altar of Repose before leaving.

A NEW COMMANDMENT

Maundy Thursday is the day on which Christians gather in obedience to Jesus's words, "A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another; even as I have loved you, that you also love one another" (John 13:34). In Latin, the first word of that verse is *mandatum* from which the word maundy comes. The new commandment was given on the same night that Jesus instituted the Lord's Supper. The gift of the Sacrament of his Body and Blood is the focus as we enter the sacred three days of the celebration of Christ's Passion, Death, and Resurrection. His sacrificial gift of himself invites and challenges us to similarly give of ourselves.

FOOT WASHING

In John's Gospel, Jesus demonstrates his love by washing the feet of his disciples and commanding them to do the same. In fact, when Saint Peter is embarrassed about having his Lord wash his feet, Jesus says to him, "Unless I wash you, you will have no part of me." Having our feet washed on Maundy Thursday is a sign of our humility and a remembrance that the servant is not greater than the Master. At St. Barnabas, we invite anyone who wishes to do so to participate in the foot washing. It is one tangible way to remind us all that we are called to be servants of one another in imitation of the One who came not to be served but to serve.

EUCHARIST

On this night we remember the last meal that Jesus shared with his disciples and his commandment that they share the same meal with one another. Christ continues to serve and to give of himself in the Eucharist. Most Christians throughout the Church's history have believed the Eucharist is more than mere remembrance. It is also Jesus giving himself, his body and blood, to us afresh in the consecrated bread and the wine. Without attempting to explain how, most Anglicans/Episcopalians accept that Christ is really present in the bread and wine of the Eucharist and treat the consecrated elements with reverence.

RESERVING THE BREAD & WINE

Because it is traditional not to celebrate Eucharist on Good Friday in recognition of our grief that the light of Christ was gone from the world, we save the bread and wine left over after the Maundy Thursday Eucharist. We also place a consecrated wafer of bread in the monstrance, a traditional vessel for containing consecrated bread. The word monstrance comes from the Latin word *monstrare*, meaning "to show." Carrying the monstrance, along with the consecrated bread and wine, in solemn procession, we place them on the "altar of repose" where those who desire may pray for our salvation in the presence of Christ and his gift of himself.

STRIPPING THE ALTAR

At the end of the service we strip and wash the altar to begin our vigil with the Lord: a time of watching, waiting, and contemplating. The actions invite us into the mystery of our redemption.
